CHAPTER 110: PEDDLERS AND SOLICITORS

Section

110.01 Private residences; uninvited entry prohibited

110.02 Exceptions

§ 110.01 PRIVATE RESIDENCES; UNINVITED ENTRY PROHIBITED.

The practice of going in and upon private residences by solicitors, peddlers, hawkers, itinerant merchants, or transient vendors of merchandise not having been requested or invited so to do by the owner or owners, occupant or occupants of these private residences for the purpose of soliciting orders for the sale of goods, wares, and merchandise and/or disposing of and/or peddling or hawking the same is declared to be a nuisance and punishable as such.

§ 110.02 EXCEPTIONS.

The provisions of this chapter shall not apply to the sale or soliciting of orders for the sale of milk, dairy products, vegetables, poultry, eggs, and other farm and garden produce, so far as the sale of the commodities named herein is now authorized by law.

§ 111.01 FCC RATE REGULATIONS ADOPTED.

The city will follow the FCC rate regulations in its regulation of the basic service rates and charges of any cable television system operating in the city, notwithstanding any different or inconsistent provisions in the franchise.

§ 111.02 CONSIDERATION OF INTERESTED PARTIES.

In connection with this regulation, the city will ensure a reasonable opportunity for consideration of the views of interested parties.

§ 111.03 ADMINISTRATION AUTHORIZED.

The Mayor, or his or her designee, is authorized to execute on behalf of the city and file with the FCC those certification forms or other instruments as are now or may hereafter be required by the FCC rate regulations in order to enable the city to regulate basic service rates and charges.
